Plan to Expand Spanish Teaching

 cates. Some regular teachers will handle the Spanish classes on an overtime basis. All will get \$3 an hour.
 "One big advantage is that pupils can be grouped in efficiency levels," Mr. Charles said. "They can be grouped according to whether they are beginners, or have had two or three years of Spanish, and can make better progress."
 "Those who don't want to take it don't have to. We are now surveying parents to see whether they want their children to take these classes."
 "As far as overtime is concerned, 90 per cent of the pupils remain on the school grounds after school is out, so their day won't be lengthened much."
 "Under this program teachers won't be bothered with pupils who don't want to study Spanish. We are more than doubling the amount of conversational Spanish taught. We believe it will mean that pupils will enter high school much better prepared in that language."
 Mr. Charles said the new program was adopted on recommendation of Carlos Rivera, Spanish supervisor, who has made a national survey of the problem.

 inmates of Tank Six where the fight occurred, said Serrano tried to get him to commit a bad act and beat him when he refused. He said Serrano kept after him, administering blows, except when Gonzales interfered.

No Guard Present
 Gonzales, Flores and Garcia testified there was no guard on the floor where Tank Six is located. Jailer E. Cordova appeared after the stabbings when someone screamed.

The jailer returned to the booking office and secured help from two patrolmen before going up to the tank and taking out the three wounded men.

Cordova testified he found a pocket-knife, a safety razor, a sharpened kitchen knife without a handle and another long bladed knife when he "shook down" the tank after all prisoners had been removed.

Leyva died yesterday afternoon in the hospital. Anaya and Serrano are reported in poor condition.

Several other inmates of the tank were placed on the witness stand but they had "clammed up" in jail parlance and told little more than their names, claiming they did not see anything occur.

Tank Six is one from which prisoners are taken out to work on road gangs.

Plan Jury Action
 "The grand jury may want to investigate conditions at the City Jail when they meet again next Wednesday," District Attorney William E. Clayton said.

Mayor Renews Plans To Move Prisoners
 Mayor Telles, who has been engaged in a campaign to move city jail prisoners from the present jail into new quarters in the City-County Building today renewed his efforts following last night's jail fight in which an inmate was killed.

The Mayor and Jack C. White visited the Central Fire Station and several other locations in town, in search of suitable quarters for the Eighth Court of Civil Appeals. The City must provide suitable quarters for the court if the move is to the satisfaction of all parties concerned.

Mayor Telles said today: "Last night's tragic incident is exactly the kind of thing we have been trying to avoid. I hope every one concerned will extend the necessary help and co-operation to make the move as quickly as possible."
 Moving to new quarters will make it possible to eliminate smuggling of dope and alcohol into the city jail and will make adequate protection of prisoners possible, observers said.

 ing tomorrow at 10 a. m. on a petition by the Little Rock school board to postpone integration for an indefinite period.

All was quiet today in the school integration crisis. No Negroes turned up at Central High School and crowds that had milled about in large numbers earlier in the week had dropped to about 150 persons.

A young man from Minneapolis was arrested for questioning when he was found with a knife. He had posed as a reporter to get through National Guard troops ringing the school.

"Thank you for your telegram in reply to my appeal for your understanding and co-operation in connection with my efforts to preserve the public peace and good order in this community," Faubus telegraphed the President.

"I have notified the U. S. district attorney and the FBI that the kind of thing we have been trying to avoid. I hope every one concerned will extend the necessary help and co-operation to make the move as quickly as possible."

"I shall co-operate in upholding the constitution of Arkansas and the nation."
 Two sides of the governor, Claude Carpenter and Kay Matthews, met with reporters. They

displayed more than 1000 telegrams they said "poured into the executive offices during the morning," congratulating the governor on his stand.

'Pattersons Dead, I Believe,' Says Closest Friend

 Neither did they draw any unusual amounts before that time. The natural question is: If they are alive, what are they using for funds?
 Even if they sold the diamond rings and wrist watches they were wearing—why?

None of "Pat's" family has shown any great interest in his whereabouts, as far as the Sheriff's office knows. In fact, Mildred Patterson in telephone conversations with Frizzell and The Herald-Post, asked the search for her brother be called off.

In both instances, she said she had been assured by Roth that "everything is all right."
 Deputy Frizzell told her that he wasn't quitting the hunt until he personally saw the Pattersons "alive and well." Sheriff Hicks backs his deputy's stand.

However, there are two persons—in addition to Ward and other friends of the missing couple—who are interested in the Pattersons.

Girl Offers to Back Search

The Mexican girl, with whom "Pat" was sitting that night of the nightclub brawl, has offered her Juarez home and her \$1600 (U. S.) bank account to help finance the search for him.

A woman in Albuquerque has been co-operative with officers seeking information as to where the missing couple might be.

Concern also has been shown by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Thompson of Wisconsin. The Thompsons are owners of the Thompson Boat Co. near Fondulac, Wis., and are long-time friends of the Pattersons.

"They are the persons who sold him the boat which he and Cecil Ward were working on the night before he and Margaret disappeared. In fact, "Pat" still owes them for the boat.

Mrs. Thompson said the Pattersons were to have arrived in Wisconsin on May 1 to attend a boat show. They never showed up.

Becoming concerned, the Thompsons telephoned the photo supply company here.

"We called several times," she said. "Each time a man named Arthur (Arturo Moreno, an employe) answered the phone and said the Pattersons were on an extended vacation.

"We called a friend of the Pattersons in Jackson, Mich. He said he had made a hotel reservation for them at the Statler Hotel in Washington, D. C., in March, for a photography convention, but they had not arrived there and had canceled.

"It isn't like the Pattersons. This man (in Michigan) has been a friend of theirs for years. We are very much upset over the whole affair."

Roth Goes to Dallas

Roth, on reading in the Herald-Post that the Pattersons were said to have been in a sanatorium, went to Dallas to check on it. A Herald-Post reporter told him of the hospital where it was believed "Pat" was being treated.

Hospital authorities told him, Roth said, that Patterson had not been there.

Roth phoned The Herald-Post and snarled: "Why did you send me on a wild goose chase?"

Roth then snapped that he wasn't going to "waste any more time" and was returning to El Paso within the hour.

Another interesting sidelight concerning Margaret Patterson involves a cat. Margaret had a little cat she thought the world of. An El Paso veterinarian said she had spent an estimated \$300 on the cat for various treatments.

Yet, no provision was made for the animal's care before she left. "That isn't like Margaret," said one of her friends. "I think she loved that cat more than anything on earth. She and 'Pat' didn't have any children, you know." The cat almost starved before neighbors called the Animal Shelter.

Not one word has been heard from either "Pat" or Margaret since their disappearance—discounting the March 15 telegram. What happened to them?

Duffy Sasser, former head of Duffy's Photo Supply, Inc., and a longtime friend of "Pat's," says he believes the Pattersons are alive and well—even after six months.

His comment was: "I think 'Pat' and his wife are entitled to a little privacy if they want it."

Ward states flatly: "I think they are dead."
 Ray Thompson says: "I can't figure it out. It's certainly not like them to do a thing like this and not tell anybody. I just don't know."

Deputy John Frizzell says: "We'll find 'em, dead or alive, and in spite of any funny business . . ."
 What do you think?
