

Ike Believes Russians Have Exiled Zhukov

(Continued from Page One) sia's economic and military aid penetration of Syria. Asked whether the Soviet penetration into the Middle East would require a strengthening of the doctrine, the President said that he was not as of now considered any expansion of the program and he doubts if it would be acceptable to Congress or the nation. It was Eisenhower's first news conference in three weeks. He dealt also with these other subjects:

Little Rock—The school integration situation at Little Rock, Ark., continues to improve, Eisenhower said, and he most devoutly hopes and prays it soon will be possible to withdraw all remaining Federal troops from that city.

Civil Rights Commission—Eisenhower said he has been looking for weeks for the right people for appointment to the new Civil Rights Commission authorized by Congress.

Spending—Asked whether it will be possible for the Government to stay within a \$70 billion spending ceiling for the fiscal year starting next July 1, Eisenhower replied that would require a very serious retortation elsewhere—meaning of spending in non-military fields.

Prices—Eisenhower replied he would have to beg off when asked whether he had any advice for housewives, consumers generally and white collar workers specifically on how to defend themselves against the continuing rise in the cost of living.

As for the stock market, Eisenhower had his economic advisers always keep a close watch on market fluctuations. Those advisers felt, he said, that market prices at one point earlier were unreasonably high.

Outer Space—There always is a problem, Eisenhower said, of deciding how much information the Government can give the American public regarding development of outer space projects without at the same time giving Russia too much helpful information.

Mideast Doctrine—Asked whether the Administration is considering trying to expand the anti-Communist Eisenhower Policy for the Middle East, the President replied that it has not been discussed. He added he doubts it could be expanded in a way that would be generally acceptable.

(Continued from Page One) he is "concerned" about the disappearance of Mr. and Mrs. Patterson.

D. G. Kirkland, president of Duffy's Photo Service, told The Herald-Post by telephone at Lubbock he has not heard from the Pattersons, that he does not know where they are, and that he has no information that would help in locating them.

In a telegram from Dallas on or about March 13, nine days after the Pattersons disappeared from El Paso, Herbert Roth was instructed that Mr. Kirkland was to serve as manager of the photo supply store, and Roth was to serve as business manager.

Mr. Kirkland later became president of the Duffy firm and moved to Lubbock.

He said today he would like to know where the Pattersons are but has no information that might enable anyone to contact them. He expressed confidence they will return to El Paso in December, the time until which the telegram directed the Patterson home should be rented. The message was received in March but the house was not rented until July.

Identifies Cat
Dr. D. L. Cady, owner of the animal hospital at 2101 Texas street where a cat identified as the Patterson cat has "lodgings," returned home last night from a trip he and Mrs. Cady made to Oklahoma.

They visited their son, Bob, at the University of Oklahoma at Norman. Dr. Cady said today, "I have every reason to believe the cat we have here is the Patterson cat." All persons who were well acquainted with Mrs. Patterson agree.

Veniremen Sought For Attack Jury

Deputy sheriffs were sent out to pick up 50 extra veniremen today as the original panel of 300 was exhausted without completing the jury to try 65-year-old John R. Motley on a charge of statutory rape of a 13-year-old girl.

Harmon T. Wilson was seated as juror No. 11 before the panel was exhausted. District Judge William E. Ward ordered the immediate pickup of the extra veniremen in an effort to get testimony under way this afternoon. Selection of the jury has been going on since Monday morning.

Equal Rates Seen Without Merger

(Continued from Page One) district will not make a definite decision regarding a merger until after a Dallas engineering firm, Forrest and Cotton, completes a water-sewer rate analysis of both districts. Mr. Soper said he thought the survey would be finished on Dec. 1.

Could Get By
The plan to reduce Valley water rates would pay like this: "We would pay \$87,000 from our maintenance and operation fund into the bond holders' trust fund. That would reduce our monthly payments to them by some \$8500 a month. We could then cut rates."

"That would curtail our operational and maintenance activities, but we believe that by charging a frontage rate for installation of water and sewer lines, we could get by," he said.

Denies Times Story
Mr. Soper, who with Valley District Attorney Joe Morgan returned from Austin late yesterday, denied a report in the El Paso Times that he was pushing for legislation to expand membership of the Public Service Board.

"We were in Austin for an entirely different purpose," said he, explaining that he and Mr. Morgan were there to attend a meeting of the Northeast Texas Municipal Water District. He said no one in the El Paso legislative delegation was contacted concerning such a bill.

At the Thursday meeting, Mr. Soper said that the Lower Valley should have representation on PSB, and said the Board should be expanded from five to nine members. State law limits membership of such boards to five.

Reds Change Tune On Middle East

UNITED NATIONS, Oct. 30.—The United States wants the entire Turkish-Syrian dispute wiped off the U. N. agenda now that the Russians apparently have changed their tune, a top American source said today.

Washington, the informant said, would prefer to have the issue "die with a dull thud."

There were indications the General Assembly was seeking ways to close the book on the "war crisis" between Syria and Turkey. Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko made an usually mild reply to the blistering attack on Soviet foreign policy by U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge last week.




