Ike Concedes Demo Wins Blow to GOP

Governor Meyner's Victory in N. Y. Upsets Republicans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Democratic gubernatorial victories yesterday in New Jersey and Virginia brought the warning from President Eisenhower and GOP National Chairman Meade ALCORN today that the Republican Party faces an uphill battle in its bid to recapture congressional control next year.

At the same time, yesterday's Demo wins put a new Presidential lustre on Governor Robert Meyner and dulled Republican hopes that Federal force in Little Rock may have brought Negro votes into the GOP camp.

Integration Is Issue
Meyner won re-election in New Jersey, swamping Republican Malcolm S. Forbes by more than 200,000 votes which showed the Democrat running stronger in key Negro areas than he did four years ago.

At the same time, Democrat J. Lindsay Almond, an all-out segregationist, captured the Virginia governorship in a decisive defeat of Republican Ted Dalton.

The Federal-State battle over school integration was the main issue in Virginia's election.

Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler hailed the Tuesday off-year election returns as evidence that the American people are "turning to the Democratic Party for leadership in a time of crisis."

He contended that the Eisenhower Administration had "lost the test" after throwing its support to GOP candidates in New Jersey, Virginia and New York City.

Swing Negro Voters
In the latter metropolitan contest, Mayor Robert F. Wagner won re-election as he defeated his GOP Opponent Robert K. Christenberry by some 900,000 votes.

Meyner not only won the governorship handily but Democrats in New Jersey captured control of the state legislature for the first time in 20 years.

The best hope the Republicans had in New Jersey was that President Eisenhower's use of Federal troops to enforce school integration in Little Rock would cause a swing of Negro voters into Forbes' corner.

Forbes, a wealthy business magazine publisher, also had administered. (Continued on Page 4, Col. 1)

Seek New Link In Flood Project

City Engineer Gerald Turner today begins talks with Ft. Bliss officials in an attempt to complete another link in the Saipan-Ledo-Durazo flood control project.

He will seek right-of-way for a large flood water storage area on Ft. Bliss land located near Pershing drive at Radford street. The area would impound waters normally flowing from Mount Franklin into the often-flooded Durazo street section.

The City has already erected three small dams across Government Hill ditch to keep Durazo dry. The Pershing storage area, and more dams north of it, are necessary before the flood project will be completely effective, Mr. Turner said.

Plastic Balloon

KHRUSHCHEV SAYS: RUSSIA SHUNS WAR

Pattersons Have Sent No Word Home

Rumors False Of Secret Messages To Associates in E. P.

Persistent rumors that Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Patterson are in secret communication with managers of their business in El Paso were exploded today as wholly false.

There is not a shred of verified evidence that Mr. and Mrs. Patterson have been seen or heard from since they disappeared from their home at 3000 Piedmont avenue last March 6.

Herbert Roth, business manager of the Patterson Photo Supply store at 113 East Main street, has heard nothing whatsoever from the Pattersons except a telegram March 6, which is not verified as actually sent by Mr. Patterson.

Hear Nothing
David J. Smith, long-time attorney for Mr. Patterson, has heard nothing from the Pattersons, and is as eager as any other friend or business associate of the Pattersons to locate them.

D. G. Kirkland, president of Duffy Photo Supply firm—with headquarters in Lubbock and a branch here, who was named in the telegram to manage the Patterson store, has heard nothing from the Pattersons since March 6.

No other business associate or friend in El Paso has heard a word from the Pattersons.

That much has been established beyond doubt by investigators who have sifted the mysterious Patterson case for three months.

It was August — three months ago and five months after the Pattersons disappeared—when their baffling, fadeout was made known to the public.

Only Hint
It is now fully established that the telegram bearing Mr. Patterson's name held out no definite indication that the Pattersons expected to return here in December, or at any other time.

The only hint of possible return given in the message was the order that the Patterson home be rented "for nine months at least."

The telegram was addressed to Mr. Roth, who has not made public its full contents. But there are others who know what the message said, some of them employees of the Patterson store.

The message said "sorry to leave so suddenly" and gave instructions on who was to manage the store, directed that the Patterson household be sold and the money used in the business, requested that the whole matter be kept quiet, and (Continued on Page 4, Col. 1)

Red Leader Calls For Conference

Declares West Will Be Unable To Halt Commies

MOSCOW, Nov. 6.—Soviet Communist Party Leader Nikita S. Khrushchev said today new Soviet technical advances meant the "capitalist order will perish" if a new war breaks out.

"But we are not striving to victory by such a path," he told a special meeting of the supreme Soviet parliament attended by Communist leaders from throughout the world.

"Relying on war," he told the cheering audience at the Luzhiki indoor sports stadium, "would be anti-moral and would be contrary to our Communist world outlook."

America Ridiculed
Khrushchev ridiculed American efforts to catch up with a Soviet technology which already has perfected the intercontinental ballistic missile and sent two artificial earth satellites hurtling into space.

Khrushchev mentioned the forthcoming Paris meeting of Nato during a three-hour and five minute major policy address to the jubilee session of the supreme Soviet. President Eisenhower is to attend the Nato meeting.

Then he called for a "high level meeting of representatives of capitalist and socialist countries so as to reach agreement on excluding war as a means of solving political questions."

'Brink of War'
Khrushchev said imperialist forces were "as Secretary of State John Foster Dulles put it, keeping the world on the brink of war."

"Even the launching of the Sputnik has been used by the imperialists to sound the alarm," he said.

"We solemnly declare that our people has never thought and does not think to use any means of destruction if our country is not subjected to an attack by imperialist states."

"A new war would produce enormous devastation and capitalism would perish," Khrushchev said.

"We are convinced that as a result of a new war the capitalist order will perish."

But he said war was not necessary.

Wars Not Needed
"Wars are not needed for the victory of socialism," he said. "Imperialists will be unable to stop the forward march of society to communism, whatever their efforts."

"A meeting of all Nato heads of state has been called for December. It promises nothing good to the cause of peace. It is not accidental that Eisenhower and Britain can complete harmony between them." (Continued on Page 4, Col. 3)
