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## Judge Orders Hearing To Start Search For Missing Pattersons

### Friday Set To Begin Investigation

Lawyer Will Seek Information On Pair's Disappearance

Judge W. E. Ward of 34th District Court today ordered a hearing which officially opens a court-sponsored search for Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Patterson.

The hearing was set for 10 a. m. Friday.

At the same time Judge Ward signed an order appointing Harold S. Long attorney to represent the couple, who have been missing since March 5, 1957.

Can They Be Found?  
Friday's hearing was ordered in connection with an application for appointment of a permanent receiver for the missing couple's business, Patterson Photo Supplies.

Auditor Herbert Roth is temporary receiver.

"The hearing is for the purpose of establishing that the Pattersons cannot be found, and what has been done to find them," Judge Ward said.

"Parties to the receivership suit are expected to appear as witnesses." He said the hearing is not a court of inquiry.

Mr. and Mrs. Patterson, defendants in the suit, were cited by publication but did not appear in court. Other defendants are D. G. Kirkland of Lubbock and the El Paso National Bank.

Named in Action  
Kirkland is an owner of Duffy's Photo Service. He was named "manager" of Patterson Photo Supplies in a telegram, signed "Pat" and sent to Roth from Dallas March 15 of last year. The telegram was the last word received from the missing couple.

Plaintiffs in the receivership action are the Eastman Kodak Co. and the Hornstein Photo Sales, Inc., creditors, and Luther M. Patterson of Chicago, father of the missing man.

Appointment of Mr. Long as attorney for the Pattersons made an official court-approved search possible. One of Attorney Long's duties will be to try to find the couple. He has records to subpoena witnesses and records, with court approval.

Attorneys for the Patterson Photo Supplies receiver, D. J. Smith and E. B. Elfers, requested the appointment of Attorney Long and the hearing.

### Expects Court Fight

Woman Given Millions Back at Regular Job

CLEBURNE, March 11.—Mrs. Agnes Kirk settled back today into her normal job of running a rest home until an expected court fight over her multi-million-dollar bequest from an oil millionaire is settled.

Mrs. Kirk, pretty 40-year-old mother of seven, came out of hiding with her family yesterday. They had fled to Fort Worth to escape publicity after the will of bachelor J. W. Sexton, 74, was published last week.

Sexton, who died Feb. 23, cut off his four nieces and a sister with \$100 each. He left the rest of his estate, estimated by most sources at \$5 million, to Mrs. Kirk. He had been a patient in her Cleburne Medical Hospital six years ago for about two years.

"I am still dumbfounded and flabbergasted," Mrs. Kirk said of the windfall yesterday. (Continued on Page 2, Col. 1)

### FCC Probers To Quiz Lawyer

WASHINGTON, March 11.—House investigators of the Federal Communications Commission will question Miami Attorney Thurman A. Whiteside again tomorrow about his dealings with resigned FCC Commissioner Richard A. Mack.

Whiteside had testified earlier but declined to appear again before the House subcommittee investigating the FCC, on grounds he had been summoned by a Federal grand jury which also is studying FCC affairs. But the Justice Department arranged for the jury to release him as a witness and free him for House questioning.

Whiteside, whose business dealings with Mack in a contested Miami TV channel award led to Mack's resignation under congressional fire, was originally scheduled to testify Wednesday before the grand jury.

## Dulles Warns Seato Of Red Threat

Declares Communists Plot New Aggression In Southeast Asia

MANILA, March 11.—A warning by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles today that the Communists may be plotting new aggression in Asia touched off demands by Seato's Asian members for more economic aid to block the Red menace.

The Philippines, Pakistan and Thailand raised the demands for aid at the afternoon session of the Seato foreign ministers meeting. They called for a sustained and realistic economic aid scheme for the have-nots of Asia who might fall prey to communism.

Charges Intensely  
Dulles spoke at the opening session this morning. He said the intensification of Communist propaganda charges against Seato could indicate new plans "which the Communist rulers fear Seato might block."

Dulles came back at the afternoon session after the economic aid issue was raised to point out that the United States in the last four years had assisted member nations in the area with hundreds of millions of dollars worth of such aid.

Economic Help  
He said that in the last year alone the United States has given \$600 million in economic assistance to three Seato member countries of the area—the Philippines, Thailand and Pakistan—and to the three protocol countries—South Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia.

Dulles emphasized that this was economic help and did not include the additional pure military aid given to this area by the United States.

Loyal Sumatrans Face Rebel Force

JAKARTA, Indonesia, March 11.—The government reported today that loyal troops advancing against the rebels in Central Sumatra have captured three towns in the off-shore islands.

An army communique identified the towns as Bengkalis, Sungai Pakning and Selai Pandjang.

The islands, off Sumatra's east coast in the strait separating the island from Malaysia, are about 95 miles from Pekanbaru, operations center of the U. S.-owned Caltex Oil Co.

In New York, a Caltex spokesman said wives and children of employees in Pakning and Dumai are being transferred to Singapore. Employee families in the inland Minas, Perawang and Dorit areas are moving to company headquarters at Rumbai.

Rebel sources in Singapore said about 4000 rebel troops have landed at Dumai, north of the islands, for a drive toward Pekanbaru and Rumbai.

The U. S. Cruiser Bremerton and the destroyers Shelton and Eversole are standing by in Singapore, ready to aid in removal of the oilworkers' families if needed.

Colonel Pirngadi, a spokesman for the Loyalist army, said "The operation is running smoothly."

Knows His Business

'I'm Clean,' Says New Member of FCC Board

WASHINGTON, March 11.—John Storres Cross, the 53-year old radio expert nominated to succeed Richard A. Mack on the Federal Communications Commission, says he's "just a country boy but clean as a hound's tooth."

A registered Democrat who was \$2650 from a lawyer associated with a Miami, Fla., TV station which later got a channel from the FCC. The White House accepted Mack's resignation within a half hour, and the next morning invited Cross to take the post.

"I guess you just found my recommendation on the top of the stack from the last go-around," said Cross. He was backed by Senator John McClellan, Arkansas Democrat, and most of the Arkansas delegation. Arkansas is his legal residence.

Although Cross himself has never held a political job, he is married to the daughter of Claude Fuller, former Arkansas congressman and still active in state Democratic politics.

### Earth Shrinks, Says Editor

All People of World Must Live in Harmony

The great increase in the world's population and accelerated transportation facilities have created problems that must result in all peoples working together, said Louis B. Seltzer, editor of the Cleveland Press, at the Hilton Hotel last night.

He was principal speaker at the annual Brotherhood dinner attended by guests representing Catholic, Jewish and Protestant faiths. Mr. Seltzer is national chairman of Brotherhood Week.

"There has been a population explosion on this planet," Mr. Seltzer said. "It has been predicted that in 20 more years, there will be a billion more people on the globe. In God's infinite wisdom, we have all come here to live and work together."

Must Live Together  
"Our problem on this earth is to learn how to live together on this planet," he said.

He pointed out that the earth has been "shrinking" due to the great advances of science and technology. It is only a matter of a few hours now to fly from one end of the earth to the other.

There have been dissimilarities created by the population increase, but speedy transportation is bringing together men who once were widely separated.

"Our challenge is not physical," he said. "Our problem with the advances of science is that of learning that we are all one in one world."

The editor of the Scripps-Howard newspaper in Cleveland said the U. S. is the greatest country in the world—that no other country on earth even remotely compares with it.

Must Nourish Our Tree  
"But," he added, "too many of us are picking the fruit of the tree of democracy—and too few of us are digging to nourish the roots of the tree."

The speaker complimented El Paso for its growth and vitality. He said the City has improved wonderfully in the 15 years since his first visit. He has visited several times, he said, and on each visit he has been inspired by El Paso's progressiveness.

Colorado Man Is Sought for Robbery

Ellis, using a .32 caliber pistol, robbed the Wyoming street tavern while dressed in a dirty cowboy hat and a wine-colored coat.

Police reported that prior to his arrival in El Paso Ellis and several companions had driven to Chihuahua, Mexico, and abandoned their auto in an attempt to make it appear as if they'd been kidnaped and murdered by bandits.

## Back Door At Bar Leads To Show

Officers Join Audience And Seize Equipment

Police nabbed 59 El Pasoans watching movies in a bar and filed charges against three of them today in County Court-At-Law for "exhibiting lewd and lascivious motion pictures."

The names of 56 who paid \$1 for admission through the back door of J. D.'s bar, 3124 Alameda street, to view the 10 reels of lewd movies were taken by police and they were released.

Charges were filed against Jesus Dominguez, owner of the bar, Ricardo Meza Jr., operator of the projector, and Armando Estrella, ticket-taker at the door.

Enter Back Door  
Vice Squad Sergeant Leland Boyce said police had been tipped that lewd movies were being shown at the bar. A group including Sergeant Ted Elkins and Vice Squad Officers Bill Risley, J. E. Hernandez and G. L. Massey posted themselves last night where they could watch entrances.

The front door of the bar was closed and locked and blinds drawn when the officers began their watch at 8 p. m.

The vice squad men watched about 30 persons enter through a back door and then sent two of their number to Justice of the Peace Ben Mejia for a search warrant.

The "tip" was that tickets were sold in advance only but when the search warrant was ready Officer Hernandez went to the back door and asked if he could go in to see a movie.

The ticket-taker asked Hernandez for \$1 for a ticket and then asked for identification.

Seats for Spectators  
Hernandez showed his badge and the search warrant and they found entered the bar where they found seats arranged, a 16-millimeter sound projector in operation and a screen on the wall.

Sergeant Boyce ordered the audience to remain in their seats while officers took their names and made them produce identification papers. The vice squad head lectured the audience on the perils of such movies and then released them.

Dominguez, Beza and Estrella, the projector, screen, 10 reels of film, tickets and \$36 found in a box were carted to jail. The three men were released into the custody of Attorney Albert Armendariz until the charges were filed today when they made \$400 bond each.

The movies, projector, screen and other paraphernalia are to be turned over to the office of County Attorney Jack Fant.
