## Find Patterson's Clothes Here

Before Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Patterson vanished from their home at 3000 Piedmont avenue last March, they left expensive clothing at cleaners and laundries that never has been picked up.

They left their electric and gas service connected and both the electricity and gas remained as they left it until the service was changed to the name of the present occupant of the house on July 15.

Every item of personal property and every household feature was left by the Pattersons just as if they expected to return in minutes or hours.

**Foul Play Strengthened**  
All this points up even more the theory that the missing couple met with foul play.

Mr. Patterson left expensive clothing for one-day service or other indication he expected to go away. The clothing is still in the cleaning plant.

Friends who attempted to telephone the Pattersons at their home during the first few days after the couple disappeared said they heard the usual sound of a telephone ringing. But some six weeks after the Pattersons disappeared, the callers heard the customary recording that the telephone was disconnected.

**Leased in July**  
Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Co. officials said they are not at liberty to disclose just when the Patterson telephone was disconnected, or by whose authority.

**Southern Union Gas Co. and El Paso Electric Co.** are not so secretive about when utilities are turned on or off. Employees of each of these companies checked the records today and said electricity and gas remained connected in the Patterson name until the house was leased in July to its present occupants.

Mr. Patterson's father, Luther M. Patterson, 77, a resident of Missouri, told The Herald-Post in August he is not anxious about the disappearance of his son—because the son previously went away for long periods without giving notice. Those periods were long ago, before the son became established as a widely known El Paso business man.

## Question Jurors On Death Penalty

The prosecution today asked the first venireman questioned in the John R. Motley rape case if she had conscientious scruples against the death penalty.

Motley is on trial on a statutory rape indictment which charges he had sexual relations with a 13-year-old girl who accompanied a party consisting of her family and Motley and his blond wife, Eunice, to El Paso from Florida.

Mrs. M. E. Ward, the prospective juror, said she had no scruples against the death penalty as such in certain crimes, including rape. She was challenged by the state after questioning developed the fact that Defense Attorneys William L. Merkin and Ray Pearson had represented her in civil litigation.

Motley, 65-years-old, gray-haired and stoop-shouldered, wiped tears from his cheeks with a handkerchief as the first prospective juror was being examined.

**Hoffa Denies He'll Step Aside**

DETROIT, Oct. 28. — Teamster Union President-Elect James R. Hoffa flatly denied today he might step aside as president until court cases against him are completed.

Rumors had it that Hoffa would offer a group trusteeship comprised of Einar G. Mohr, administrative vice president, John F. English, Teamster secretary-treasurer and a third high ranking officer.

**Cabinet Sworn In**  
BONN, Oct. 28. — West German President Theodor Heuss today handed the scrolls of office to members of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's new cabinet which will be sworn in before parliament tomorrow.

**112 Deaths Predicted**  
WASHINGTON, Oct. 28. — The American Automobile Assn. predicted today that 28 hunters will be killed and 112 injured in gun accidents in cars unless they are more careful with firearms.

## Puzzle Grows Over Ouster Of Zhukov

Feeling Spreads That General's Removal Was Step Downward

MOSCOW, Oct. 28.—The belief is growing among Westerners in Moscow that Marshal George K. Zhukov's removal as defense minister means he has been downgraded and that Nikita Khrushchev sits firmly in the Kremlin saddle.

Soviet officialdom is still veiled in silence. Nothing specific has been added to the terse, nine-line announcement Saturday that Zhukov has been replaced by Marshal Radion Y. Malinovsky.

Most Western diplomats in Moscow believe that regardless of whether Zhukov receives a new government post, Khrushchev's authority in the Kremlin is at least as strong as ever.

**Only One Effect**  
They also believe that there will be no adverse reaction in the country, no matter where Zhukov turns up next.

One veteran western diplomat said: "The omission from the official announcement of any indication that the change was made to permit Zhukov's assignment to other duties—such as premier or deputy premier—could have only one possible effect on the Soviet public. They would read into the announcement that Zhukov is out."

"Certainly if the Communist high command planned to kick Zhukov upstairs into a new job there would have been some hint of it in the announcement if for no other reason than for home consumption."

**See More Changes**  
In the West a host of theories about Zhukov's fate kept even the best informed experts on Russia puzzled. Soviet censorship prevented

ed Moscow correspondents from sending some interpretations of the Zhukov removal.

Diplomats in London suggested there soon might be more changes in the Kremlin.

They said Khrushchev seemed to have tightened his hold by removing his strongest potential rival for power.

## Historian Tabs Ike As Uninformed

CHICAGO, Oct. 28. — Poet-historian Carl Sandburg said last night "there are all sorts of things" about Americans that President Eisenhower doesn't know.

The 79-year-old Lincoln expert said Eisenhower had spent 15 years in the Philippines during his Army life and that he believed a military career was a "hindrance" to the presidency.

"Let the military men stay with the military," Sandburg said.

**14 Texans Make Top U. S. Millionaire List**

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Fourteen Texans today made Fortune Magazine's list of the nation's very big rich—the men and women with wealth estimated at \$75 million or more.

They constituted about 18 per cent of the total list of 76 names.

The richest of all, the magazine said, is not a Texan, but he is nevertheless an oil man, a California expatriate, J. Paul Getty, now living in Paris. Getty's interests include Getty Oil and Tidewater Oil companies, with fabulous holdings in the Middle East. His wealth is estimated at from \$700 million to \$1 billion.

The richest Texan of all is H. L. Hunt, Dallas, independent oil operator, whose wealth is estimated at from \$400 million to \$700 million.

In the same category are six other persons, including two wom-

# Mystery Man Prowls In Another Home

## Program Of Daniel Takes Whole Session

Chief Executive's 5 Proposals to Take All Time Allotted Solons

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—House Speaker Waggoner Carr today said he didn't know whether or not the Legislature can complete action on Governor Price Daniel's five-point program so that other matters can be presented for consideration next week.

In an exclusive interview with The Herald-Post Austin correspondent, Speaker Carr said: "There are still some things that are unpredictable as far as setting any time limit."

**Not Going Too Fast**  
"We will do the best we can. "There are a lot of questions that still have to be worked out."

Governor Daniel said Saturday officially that if the Legislature completes action on his program this week then two subjects pertaining to the school segregation issue could be considered starting next Monday.

**Integration Measures**  
The Herald-Post had previously carried exclusive stories on this.

One subject would allow for the closure of any Texas school occupied by Federal troops. The other would direct the attorney general to defend school districts involved in integration lawsuits.

Governor Daniel will also consider at the end of this week whether to allow the Legislature to act on some 50 requests for local bills.

During a special session the governor decides what subjects are to be considered by the Legislature.

The deadline for the current session is Nov. 12.

**Freezing Weather Again Hits Texas**  
Sub-freezing weather again hit a number of Texas points last night but forecasters said a general warming trend was in prospect for the state.

## Intruder Frightens E. P. Woman

Believed To Be One Who Entered Hervey Home

The mysterious intruder who has entered at least six homes recently, prowled again early today.

He entered the Leon Siegel home at 4228 Hampshire street and was frightened away by their screams.

He took 34 cents from Mrs. Siegel's purse.

Mrs. Fred Hervey, wife of the former mayor, said she was unable to determine from the description if the intruder were the same man who broke into her home at 4025 North Kansas street and beat her several weeks ago.

"I didn't get a good enough look at the prowler," she said. "I couldn't tell the color of his hair or how it was cut."

The Siegel home is only a few blocks from the Hervey home.

The Siegels said the prowler was young — about 20 or 21, about six feet tall, blond hair cut short and was wearing a dark turtle neck sweater and dark trousers.

An El Paso housewife, who asked that her name not be used told The Herald-Post her maid surprised a man in her yard at night about a week ago whose description tallies almost exactly with the description given by the Siegels.

Mrs. Siegel said she and her husband were asleep when she awakened. "When I opened my eyes, I saw the man's back," she said.

"I was paralyzed with fear. I didn't say a word. I don't think I could have, I was so scared. "The man walked through our bedroom door. He was as quiet (Continued on Page 4, Col. 1)
