



Getty's interests include Getty Oil and Tideholdings in the Middle East. His fortune. wealth is estimated at from \$700 million to \$1 billion. The richest Texan of all is H. L.

Hunt, Dallas, independent oil operator, whose wealth is estimated at from \$400 million to \$700 million. In the same category are six other persons, including two wom- independent oil operator; William

(Ailsa Mellon), New York; Arthur Vining Davis, Miami, Aluminum rich-the men and women with Co, of America and Florida real estate; Paul Mellon, Virginia; Richard King Mellon, Pittsburgh; John D.
