

Mrs. Patterson Left Fur Coat 5 Days Before Disappearing

Intended to Tell How To Remodel Garment

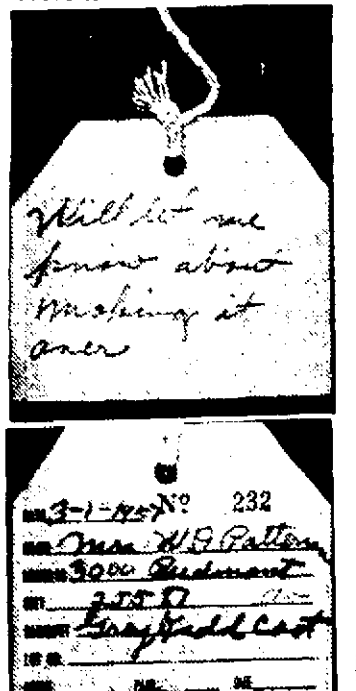
(Related News on Page 1.) Five days before she and her husband disappeared from El Paso, Mrs. W. D. Patterson left a fur coat to be remodeled at a fur shop, and was to return to give alteration instructions—but never returned.

The coat was left March 1 at the Galvin Fur Shop at 415 East Franklin street. Mrs. Josephine Galvin, owner of the shop, said Mrs. Patterson brought the coat in and said she would return later and give instructions for remodeling the coat.

Mr. and Mrs. Patterson have not been seen in El Paso since March 6. More exactly, the Pattersons were not seen by anyone here since late in the day of March 5, so far as has been disclosed.

"I found the coat in the storage room," Mrs. Galvin said today. "The tag notes Mrs. Patterson was to return and give instructions for remodeling the coat, she never came back. That is all we know about it."

Mr. Patterson also left clothing in a cleaning plant, and did not return to pick it up, or telephone to order it delivered.

PEOPLE... Boss Spots Set Services His Fleeting Bookkeeper For Merchant

A New York bus line executive met his bookkeeper at Newark, N. J., airport yesterday, with both holding tickets for the same flight to Miami. The chance meeting resulted in the bookkeeper being arrested on a grand larceny charge.

Police gave this account: Sidney Engelhardt, president of Gray Line Bus Tours, Inc., discovered a \$6000 shortage when his bookkeeper for three years, Raymond Farrell, 33, of Brooklyn, failed to report to work last Monday.

Engelhardt notified police but went ahead with plans for a Florida vacation.

When he met Farrell boarding a plane Engelhardt called airport police.

A Georgia segregation leader said today at Dalton Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt was in error when she said the late President was forced by law to accept racial restrictions in deeds to property at Warm Springs, Ga.

A clause prohibiting Roosevelt land at Warm Springs from being transferred to any Negro or group controlled by Negroes "was imposed by Mr. Roosevelt for reasons solely personal to himself," R. Carter Pittman, Dalton attorney, said.

Pittman cited Mrs. Roosevelt's article in the November issue of McCall's magazine in which she said "such wording or similar wording had to be in any deed, according to the law of that part of Georgia."

Referring to the late President, Mrs. Roosevelt said:

"He told me at the time that he disliked the restriction, but there was no other way that a deed could be written in that area."

Pittman, a former member of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Warm Springs Memorial Commission, said there was no Georgia law "at any time before or since that required a racial restrictive clause."

He quoted W. S. Allen, Greenville, Ga., attorney whom he described as a personal friend of Mrs. Roosevelt, as saying the Roosevelt deeds were the only ones he had seen, in 37 years of legal practice in the county, which contained the race restrictions.
